

all denominations may participate. Unsolicited contributions or bequests toward an endowment are accepted. Occasionally a gift is made for educational travel and has to be spent that way. This accounts for trips to Howe Caverns, Washington, D. C., Niagara Falls, etc.

4. PAYMENTS

A pass card holder dropped from club privileges for non-payment of obligations can be reinstated only by paying them in full. Dues are charged for unless a resignation in writing is received. When a resignation is not handed to the cashier, and absence exceeds 4 months, reinstatement is allowed on payment for back dues up to \$2.50 and \$2 in advance for the current pass card period.

Bullets are sold at 10 cents for 10 shots and must not be taken from (he range by minors. A range fee of 10 cents per session for holders of current pass cards or 20 cents per session for non-pass card holders, includes rent, use of guns, targets, instruction, and diplomas. Non-pass card holders who use the range must have a guardian who is a P. B. C. sustaining member for which a minimum fee of \$1 annually is paid.

Save the receipt for all payments or else you may have to pay over again in case of some error in records.

The cashier will not accept dues nor issue receipt until one shows:

(a) In (he case of a member not joining "or the first time, he must show his previous receipt to prove (hat he does not owe for past periods, since back dues must be paid.

(b) The boy must display sustaining membership card of guardian which must not have expired.

Admission to see the model railroad is free except during the carnival. Anyone wishing to run the toys in the model railroad must either be a current pass card holder in the Presbyterian Boys' Club or a sustaining member, or a Director, or pay a visitor's fee at the current rate to the club cashier in addition to paying 10¢ to the railroad supervisor for each 2 minutes of operation, (or 5¢ for 12 minutes). The charge is waived when applicant purchases a life membership in either the "0" gauge and monorail department or the standard gauge and navigation department. either of which sells for 25¢ to children or 50¢ to persons over 17 years.

Persons using games deposit 5 cents per game and receive a refund when same arc returned in good order.

Refreshments, meals, banquets, board at camp, Boy Scout membership, uniforms or costume materials, trips, craft shop materials, rifle range medals or emblems, etc., are sometimes charged for at reasonable rates, if used.

5. LIABILITY

You participate in activities at your own risk. At all times do your part to observe "SAFETY

FIRST." The club is not responsible for personal property. Valuables should be checked with cashier. Keep your coat, hat, and other wearing apparel in the room where you are so you can watch them. Anything left by you at the club will be done away with after a reasonable time.

6. RULES AND PENALTIES

It is required that each person be loyal to the club and its officers, keep hands off other persons, do lessons before coming to club, try for Gold Cross when of age, and strive to live a Christian life by observing "Golden Rule."

Tobacco, bad language, gambling, rough* house, and ungentlemanly deportment are prohibited.

It is forbidden to use matches or lighters on Church property.

Boys will enter the First Presbyterian Church only by the southwest corner door located at rear of Church, reached by side walk from Kearny Ave.

Anyone forcing entrance into the club at times when it is not regularly open is breaking a law and will be dealt with by the police.

All persons must keep off lawn or terrace of any Church as well as off property of neighbors adjoining such Church.

Throwing snow or any objects around Church property that might endanger expensive windows is prohibited.

Within Church buildings the boy must go directly to (he room where (he activity is conducted; no loitering is permitted around entrances or hallways. The boy must remain in the room where supervision is provided and must not explore into other parts of the Church.

When the club rooms are crowded at least four persons should play on each pool table. A few can not monopolize them to the exclusion of others. Time limits are at the discretion of the supervisors.

Members are expected to read the bulletin boards in club room each time they enter and are responsible for observance of all rules posted there.

Great care should be used in treatment of Church property. When moving chairs don't knock them over. Don't sit on tables. Do not touch pianos. They are reserved for authorized musicians.

Violations of all these rules are punishable by immediate dismissal from the activity plus a suspension of one week and such other penalty as the Disciplinary Committee (3 members of the P. B. C. Directors) shall decide. Failure to move fast when dismissed by an authorized supervisor will result in increased penalty.
